But no pillow fights... 4-H Camp-In at Pacific Science Center Slated for April 1-2

Bridges, tropical butterflies, and dancing with dinosaurs are just a few of the features of the annual sleep-over known as the 4-H Pacific Science Center Camp-In.

The event, held at the science center in downtown Seattle, will take place from 6 p.m., Saturday, April 1, until 9:30 a.m., Sunday, April 2. Registration is available at <http://4h.wsu.edu/conferences/Campin/>, and is due March 10.

"It gets kids excited about science," said *Kevin Wright*, 4-H state program manager at the WSU Puyallup Research and Extension Center. "It also fits in real well with 4-H because the programming is all hands-on."

One of the main workshops this year is entitled "Get Over It: Bridges." This session focuses on how bridges are built, and why there are different shapes and types of bridges. Campers will have a hands-on experiment with bridge components, learning about the forces that act upon bridges and the factors civil engineers consider before designing and building a bridge. Participants will have the chance to build a mini-model of a bridge and create a blueprint to take home.

Traditionally, the sleep-over attracts about 200 youth and 50 parents and other adults, Wright said. The event is open to all Washington 4-Hers and is sponsored by WSU, USDA, and Washington counties. This year's event will have an additional twist: Washington 4-H is partnering with the state's Camp Fire Girls program.

Participants bring their sleeping bags, pillows, and everything else needed for a slumber party. Dinner, snacks, and breakfast are included in the \$40-per-person registration fee.

"It's a fun event for the kids and their parents," Wright said. "Every year, everyone goes home happy."

Washington State 4-H Hosts Our National Colleagues

Over 1,200 colleagues from across North America came to Seattle for the annual meeting of the National Association of Extension 4-H Agents (NAE4-HA), hosted by the professional 4-H staff of Washington State from October 30 to November 4.

This was a first-time hosting experience for the Washington 4-H team in the 59-year history of NAE4-HA, attracting one-third of the entire organizational membership.

Planning for the national meeting actually began over five years ago and has engaged our entire 4-H system. With a theme of “Traditions, Trends, and Technologies,” the conference provided participants the opportunity to strengthen traditional 4-H programs, review and understand current youth development trends, and explore methodologies for incorporating technology throughout all aspects of the 4-H program.

Workshops, poster sessions, hands-on training adventures, and keynote speakers were all geared to strengthen the professional skills of the 4-H youth development staffer.

The NAE4-HA Conference began on Sunday afternoon with a showcase of Washington 4-H members and their projects at Pike Place Market. This public event attracted Gloria Estefan and her daughter as well as hundreds of others who saw 4-H members and their projects in action, from aquatic robotics to goats to intelligent rats! Then the Pike Place Market was converted into a Taste of Washington outdoor dining venue for the conference attendees who enjoyed Washington’s tasty agricultural products: from oysters to asparagus, goat cheese to shrimp, beef kabobs to ice cream. It was truly a festival of Washington’s bounty.

Conference highlights included Mark Williams, best-selling author of *10 Lenses: Your Guide to Loving and Working in a Multicultural World!* Mr. Williams’ mission was to assist individuals and the 4-H organization in managing pressing issues related to today’s global environment.

Another conference highlight was the presentation by Trish Millines Dziko, founder of the Technology Access Foundation, which strives to connect high achieving youth of color with technology resources. She is an inspiring example of the power of an individual to instigate profound community change.

Hosting a national event such as the NAE4-HA annual meeting was a tremendous team effort by 4-H staffers, Extension colleagues, 4-H volunteer leaders and members, and Extension administrators. Over 70 donors, including the National 4-H Council, the Northwest Farm Credit Services, and the Washington State 4-H Foundation, helped sponsor the event.

A heartfelt bouquet of clovers is extended to all our friends and donors who made the event a great success.

Founded in 1946, NAE4-HA helps 4-H youth development educators build professional and personal competencies by:

- Encouraging use of currently accepted positive youth development practices in all programs for youth, families, and communities;
- Promoting positive ethics, behavior, and professional integrity to all staff, volunteers, and audiences;
- Serving as a catalyst for collaborations, coalition development, and teamwork to enrich the lives of youth and adults;
- Conducting and applying cutting-edge youth development research to impact emerging youth issues.



King County 4-H Initiates County- Level KYG Program

In an innovative new county-level Know Your Government (KYG) program, King County 4-H members interact with their local government officials. To inaugurate the process, **Emily Peel** stepped to the microphone to present a preliminary report.

“So far this year, we have over 500,000 community service hours by adults, and the value of the volunteer hours by both youth and adults totals over \$5.7 million,” Peel told the council.

The county program is modeled after the long-established and successful state level 4-H Know Your Government program in which 4-H members learn about how state government functions and travel to Olympia to interact with their state legislators.

Taking the KYG concept to the county level was the brainchild of **Carris E. Booker**, King County 4-H youth development educator. Booker believes the new King County program is the only one of its kind in the nation and could serve as a model.

4-H members from throughout the county received special recognition from the council for their community service and initiation of the program.

Council member Peter Von Reichbauer told his colleagues that 4-H is having a positive impact in every one of their districts.

“What’s so unique about 4-H is it’s not a rural program, it’s not an urban program, and it’s not a suburban program,” said Von Reichbauer. “It takes in all three of those zones that overlap in our community. It’s great to see all the people that are involved.”

Council member Julia Patterson, whose daughters were 4-H members, lauded the new Know Your King County Government program for encouraging civic engagement.

“This program allows young people to become civically engaged in their government and understand how our democracy works,” Patterson told her colleagues.

Participating 4-H clubs will interact with their council members to identify community needs within the council district that could benefit from 4-H volunteer involvement and will report their community service to the council twice yearly.

An online reporting system has been established so that 4-H clubs can easily log volunteer hours and community service activities, Booker says.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Washington State 4-H members who are seniors in high school or completing their GED are eligible for 15 different scholarships offered by the Washington State 4-H Foundation. Last year, over \$11,500 in scholarships was awarded to Washington State 4-H youth.

In conjunction with the WSU College of Agricultural, Human, and Natural Resource Sciences, we are excited to offer four \$1,500 Washington State University 4-H scholarships: two for achievement in leadership and two for achievement in citizenship/community service. Each of these scholarships is worth \$1,500 toward tuition in a student's freshman year at Washington State University in the College of Agricultural, Human, and Natural Resource Sciences.

Other Washington 4-H scholarships require a completed 4-H scholarship application and Washington State 4-H scholarship supplemental application information form. Each applicant will be considered for all Washington State 4-H scholarships. These applications must be postmarked by March 1, 2006. The scholarships may be used at any institution offering post-secondary education.

This year, 4-H Dairy members in their senior year of high school and currently enrolled college students have the opportunity to compete for two \$500 scholarships sponsored by the Washington State 4-H Foundation Dairy Endowment.

Year in Review

The Washington State 4-H Foundation has been investing in youth throughout the state of Washington since 1961. This year, through the generosity of private donors, the 4-H Foundation provided a total of \$330,160 in support to the 4-H Program. Direct support went to 15 counties as well as many statewide programs and project areas.

Through the Harry Burcalow and Chevron Community Pride Grant Programs, the Foundation awarded \$13,547 in grants to counties and clubs. Projects ranged from citizenship through support of the Public Adventures curriculum in Lincoln County to 4-H Challenge Rock Climbing in Chelan and Douglas counties to the King County Know Your Government Program to the Grays Harbor Historical Seaport 4-H Longboat Project and many others.

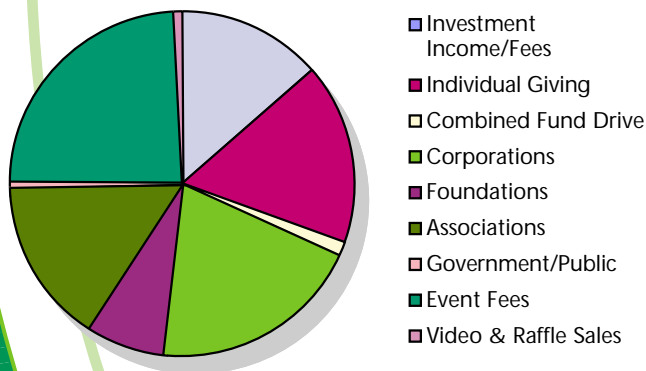

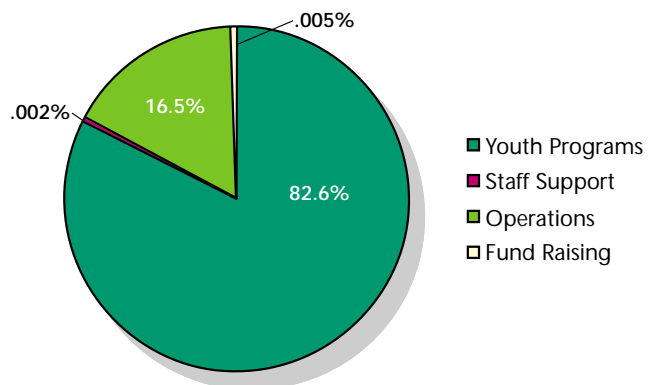

DONOR SPOTLIGHT ON...

Harry Burcalow

Retired Extension agent, long-time 4-H fan



Harry Burcalow has appreciated 4-H from a variety of perspectives.

As a child in the small community of Bruce, Wisconsin, he participated in 4-H for nearly a decade. He remembers working in the Victory Garden program of World War II as well as participating in the shop, electrical, photography, dairy, and swine activities.

As a father, he and his wife Janet helped their three children participate in 4-H in everything from model rocketry to shop to photography to clothing, cooking, and sewing.

As an Extension educator of 34 years—both in Minnesota and Washington—he worked alongside 4-H specialists and agents, and saw firsthand the benefit of their work in local communities.

“I’ve always been a strong supporter of 4-H,” said Burcalow, who retired from WSU in 1998 as associate dean and director of what was then called WSU Cooperative Extension. “I believe in the value of the program and what it can do for young people in terms of leadership and citizenship.”

And, Burcalow adds, it’s not just youth who benefit from 4-H.

“It really provides the opportunity for parents to work directly with their children at the club level or in their activities, which increases the communications between parent and child,” he said.

4-H programming has expanded dramatically over those years, Burcalow said. “Many of the programs I grew up with still exist, but 4-H also has expanded into non-rural settings, which is a big plus.”

Currently an honorary trustee of the 4-H Foundation, Burcalow has made significant financial donations to the program. In fact, the Foundation established the Harry Burcalow Endowment in his honor to provide grants to 4-H clubs or county 4-H programs for new or special projects and emerging or emergency needs. That endowment provides about \$3,200 annually in grants.

Burcalow joined WSU in 1985 as state program leader for agriculture and natural resource programs. He became associate dean and director in 1993 and retired in 1998. He then went to work as a reservist for FEMA and just recently retired from that after completing a stint in Jackson, Mississippi, rebuilding after Hurricane Katrina. Now living in Spokane, he continues his volunteer work with his church and the Ag Bureau of the Spokane Chamber of Commerce.

Navona Ouimette Stevens County

Navona Ouimette was involved in the Stevens County 4-H program both as a main club leader and project leader for 22 years, before her death in 2004. She established the county 4-H Cat Program, developing publications and fair displays. She generously supported fair programs, including donations for beautification and repairs.
